Mathematics Year 2: (2M3a) Recognise and use symbols for pounds (£) and pence (p); combine amounts to make a particular value

#### About this resource:

Crisps 25p




Cake 89p

Various answers, for example: Jack could have 1p, 1p, 2p, 5p, 10p, 10p, 50p (79p); Elsa could have 1p, 2p, 5p, 20p (28p) and Tom could have 20p, 20p and 10p (50p).

2. Theo wants to buy one item from the shop. He has the following coins in his piggy















He uses 6 coins to pay for one of the following items:



**Drink** 75p



Lolly 13p



Apple 18p



Crisps 25p



Cake 89p

Investigate the different items Theo could have bought and the coins he could have used. Theo could buy the drink (20p, 20p, 10p, 10p, 10p, 5p), the crisps (10p, 5p, 5p, 2p, 2p, 1p) or the the apple (5p, 5p, 2p, 2p, 2p, 2p). He would not be able to buy the lolly or cake with 6 coins.
