### Worksheet:

The aim of this activity is for children to practise using adjectives in sentences. There are a number of questions to complete. The first four questions allow children to practise the skill, while the next three questions extend them as they have to apply their learning to get the answer.

## Vocabulary:

A **complete sentence** begins with a capital letter, has a main clause (see definition below) and finishes with a full stop, question or exclamation mark. A complete sentence expresses an idea or thought, always contains a verb and must include the correct punctuation. A complete sentence should always make sense on its own.

A **main clause** contains a subject and a verb, and makes complete sense on its own. A main clause can also be a simple sentence. For example: I read books.

Adjectives describe nouns. They can describe aspects like colour, shape, size and age, amongst other qualities.

Nouns are naming words. It is a person, animal, thing or place.
