Worksheet:

The aim of this activity is for children to practise using commands. There are a number of questions to complete. The first four questions allow children to practise the skill, while the next three questions extend them as they have to apply their learning to get the answer.

Vocabulary:

A verb is an action word such as jump, skip, shout.

A **command** is a type of sentence which gives an instruction. It includes an imperative (or bossy) verb which is often at the beginning of the sentence. For example: Tidy up your toys.

Using Commands

1. Walk quietly to your classroom please.

Please pick up all the rubbish.

2. fetch, mix, fold

3. Stand

4. Exclamation mark: Don't run!

5. The command should be rewritten as a direct command, for example: Get down before you hurt yourself!

6. Various answers, for example:

'Push me!'; 'Push that button please.'; 'Don't push it!'

7. Josie is incorrect because she has written a direct order. If she wanted to write a polite request she could have written: Please get out of the way.
