Activity:

The aim of this activity is for children to practise finding equivalent fractions by dividing the numerators and denominators by the same number. There are three questions to complete. The first two questions allow children to practise the skill, while the third question extends them as they have to problem solve and explain their answer.

Vocabulary:

Equivalent means equal in value. For example, equivalent fractions may use different numerators and denominators, but represent the same part of a whole.

The **numerator** and **denominator** are the parts of a fraction. The **numerator** is the number above the line in a fraction and it indicates the number of parts out of the whole there are. The **denominator** is the number below the line in a fraction and it indicates how many equal parts a whole has been divided into.
