Worksheet:

The aim of this activity is for children to practise using paragraphs in fiction. There are a number of questions to complete. The first four questions allow children to practise the skill, while the next three questions extend them as they have to apply their learning to get the answer.

Vocabulary:

A **paragraph** is a group of sentences that share a common idea. A new paragraph should be started where there is a change of time, location, character or theme.

A sentence opener is a word or phrase used at the start of a sentence.
