# Year 6 Identifying Determiners, Conjunctions and Prepositions in Sentences – Guidance for Parents

## **Activity:**

The aim of this activity is for children to practise identifying determiners, conjunctions and prepositions in sentences. There are three questions to complete. The first two questions allow children to practise the skill, while the third question extends them as they have to apply their learning to get the answer.

### Vocabulary:

A **preposition** is a type of word used to tell you where or when something is in relation to something else, for example: after, under, over.

A **conjunction** is a word used to join two clauses. There are different kinds of conjunction such as for time (e.g. after), place (e.g. where) and cause (e.g. because).

A **determiner** is a word that comes before a noun or a noun phrase, for example: the, a, two.

#### Identifying Determiners, Conjunctions and Prepositions in Sentences

- 1. Determiners: my, several, their, that; conjunctions: while, because, unless, when, even though, however; prepositions: through, next to.
- 2. Jane crawled through the undergrowth even though she knew her mum would be cross.
- 3. Neither of them have achieved this. Jeremy has used two determiners: their, our; two prepositions: off and while; and one conjunction: so.
  Selina has used two determiners: my, your; two conjunctions: when, before and one

preposition: off.
